

Chapter I INTRODUCTION

A group of Nepali social workers with varied professional background got committed to the cause of the ageing population and together established **AGEING NEPAL (AN)** in August 2011.

Ageing Nepal is a not-for-profit Non-Government Organization (NGO) registered with the government of Nepal and is also affiliated to Social Welfare Council (SWC). Ageing Nepal is a member based organization operated by trustees, member representatives and professionals. It draws on its wide network of members and professionals in and out of the country for accomplishment of a task with high degree of professionalism.

Objectives

- To link ageing population and societal development by treating ageing as an opportunity for development
- To establish sustainable system of social protection to guard against poverty in old age
- To promote healthy, active and productive ageing through promotion of volunteerism among elders in particular
- To meet the growing demands of access to quality health care, including long-term care for the elderly
- To promote age-friendly environment
- To work with the government and other national and international organizations for the promotion of elders' wellbeing

Mission

- Empowerment of elders and promotion of their rights
- Generate research based information to help policy makers and planners
- Produce trained human resources in the field of Gerontology and Geriatrics
- Take proactive measures against elder abuse and exploitation
- Work as watchdog to safeguard the interests of ageing population

Vision

With a life time of hard work, senior citizens of today deserve a dignified and care for old age, not as a charity from the younger generation but as the rights of their own. As elders are the living history of a society, it is very important to utilize their knowledge, skills and experience for socio-economic development. Chapter II ACTIVITIES FOR AND BY SENIOR CITIZENS

This report in essence is the summary of 12 issues of Voice of Senior Citizens (VoSC) published in 2015. The monthly report "Voice of Senior Citizens" categorically published news according to their nature. In this book the data are presented according to its categorization. VoSC compiled the information published in major National Nepali Dailies- Kantipur, Annapurna Post, Gorkhapatra, and English Dailies- The Himalayan Times and news broadcasted in Nepal's Digital news (Setopati and Online Khabar) from January to December 2015 about senior citizens of Nepal. It is further enriched with information from police reports, concerned agencies, individuals and reporters of Ageing Nepal.Collected news and views are processed in terms of avoiding duplication, summarizing and categorizing of the information. All published information are included in this book.

We hope that the social workers, academicians, policy and programme formulators and anyone interested on issues of ageing population of Nepal will find this report useful to their work.

1. ADVOCACY

Advocacy is a performed activity for supporting or recommending senior citizens for some causes or purposes. This section includes various types of campaign activities that advocate some particular purpose.




Figure 1: Monthly Distribution of Advocacy Events Organized in 2015

The line graph illustrates the total number of advocacy events organized in the year 2015. A total of 19 different events were organized across the country in the year 2015. It is observed that more number of campaign activities were launched in the month of February (5). However, no such news was reported to in the month of March, April and July. Compared to the data of 2014, 5 more programmes were organized in the year 2015. Details are in Annex Table 1.

2. SOCIAL SUPPORT

Social Support includes programmes/efforts organized to establish new shelter homes (i.e. OAH and Day Care Centers) for senior citizens and to support residents of OAH as well as non-residents. It also includes the felicitation programmes of elderly.

a) Felicitation

This sub-section includes the news of felicitating elderly in recognition to their some remarkable deeds. The felicitator could either be an individual/s or an organization/s.




Figure 2: Monthly Distribution of Felicitated Senior Citizens in 2015

The graph shows that a total of 135 senior citizens were felicitated throughout the year 2015. It is observed that more number of senior citizens were felicitated in the months of January (50), March (57) and July (17). However, no news on felicitation of senior citizens was reported in the month of May, June, September and November.

Compared to data of 2014, the number of felicitated senior citizens dramatically decreased this year. Last year a total of 1189 senior citizens were felicitated which is 8 times more than this year's data.

b) Support Provided

This section provides the number of various organized programmes for the assistance of OAHs and senior citizens.

The line graph presents the total number of programmes organized to support senior citizens and OAHs in the year 2015. A total of 46 programmes were organized to support OAHs and senior citizens. Among them 16 programmes were to support the OAHs and 30 were to support senior citizens.

3. SOCIAL SECURITY

Social security is a concept of being secured in society from want. It has even been enshrined in article 22 of Universal Declaration of Human Rights. For millions of the elderly who would otherwise be poor, social security is the single reliable source of income. In this section, news related to old age allowance, its misuse, irregular distribution etc. are included. Details available in annex table 5.

4. ACTIVE AGEING

Active Ageing refers to process of optimizing opportunities for health, participation and security to enhance quality of life. This section, however, entails elderly related those news where they actively participate in some income generating activities, educational activities and social activities.




Figure5: Number of Active Elderly involved in Various Activities

The bar graph presents the number of active elderly who involved in various activities in the year 2015. A total of 33 news were reported throughout the year.

- a) 9 news were about senior citizens earning their livelihood through informal sectors such as farming, labour and small business.
- b) 6 news were about senior citizens' involvement in educational activities.
- c) 10 news were related with involvement of senior citizens in social service.
- d) 8 news were reported on involvement of senior citizens on other activities such as recording songs and preserving the dolphin.

5. RIGHTS

The term rights encompasses a wide range thereby could be used in various senses. Rights are the fundamental normative rules about what is owed to people by virtue of some title in a person. This section, however, only includes the issues of obtaining the Citizenship Certificate owed to people. Three elderly received citizenship certificates in the year 2015. For details annex table no. 7

6. EMERGENCY

This section covers the number of dead elderly due to hazardous situations and elderly who are seeking for immediate response.

Elderly died of Emergency and Hazardous Situations:

- A total of 10 elderly died due to various hazardous situations.
- Majority of the victims (8) died due to Fire.
- 1 died due to snowfall.

• 1 died due to drowning.

The bar graph shows a total of 54 news were published highlighting the emergency situation of elderly and their reasons in the year 2015.

- It is observed that the majority of news (30) were about those elderly who were displaced and suffered due to natural disaster.
- 6 news were about helpless elderly.
- 5 news were related with the elderly facing problem due to ongoing agitation.
- 4 news were about homeless elderly
- 3 news were about the empty nest syndrome.
- 4 news were about other emergency situation.

7. ELDER ABUSE

Elder abuse is any form of mistreatment that results in bodily injury, pain or impairment, to psychological trauma caused by perpetrators or other individual/s. It includes assault, battery and inappropriate restraint. This section includes various forms of abuses such as Physical abuse, Financial abuse, Psychological abuse, Sexual abuse, and Neglect.

a) Physical Abuse

Physical abuse is a physical force that results in bodily injury, pain or impairment that can lead to death. It includes assault, battery, and inappropriate restraint.

b) Financial Abuse

Financial abuse is the illegal or improper use of an older person's funds, property or resources.

c) Psychological Abuse

Psychological abuse is the willful influencing of mental or emotional anguish by threat humiliation or other verbal or nonverbal conduct.

d) Sexual Abuse

Sexual abuse is non-consensual sexual contact of any kind with an older person.




Figure 6: Monthly Distribution of Abused Elderly

The line graph compares monthly distribution of number of elderly (Dead+ Not dead) who faced various forms of abuses in the year 2015. A total of 79 elderly were abused in the year 2015. Among them 37 died and 42 survived.

- Out of 42 sustained after abuse, 21 were males and 21 were females.
- Average age of victim is approximately 72 years whereas the corresponding figure for male and female are 69 years and 77 years respectively.
- In 17 (45.9%) cases the culprits were victims' own family members.
- 9 (24.3%) culprits were villagers, 7(19%) were unknown and 4(10.8%) were neighbours.
- January and April months witnessed maximum abuse cases 5/5 cases on each.
- Rupandehi, Rauthat and Sarlahi districts had maximum no. of abuse cases 3 cases in each. Similarly, Saptari and Jhapa districts had two cases on each.

8. NEGLECT

Neglect is the failure of a caregiver to fulfill his/her care giving responsibilities to provide needed care to the elderly. However, this report provides data of the unattended deaths of older people caused by negligence.




Figure 7: Monthly Distribution of Abandoned Dead Bodies Found in 2015

The graph demonstrates the monthly distribution of abandoned dead bodies of elderly found in the year 2015. A total 50 abandoned dead bodies of senior citizens were found in different parts of the country.

- Among them 38 were males and 12 were females.
- The more no. of dead bodies were found in the month August (11), July (8) and January (6).
- Average age of male and female who met unattended death was 71 years and 72.1 years.
- The number of abandoned dead bodies in the year 2015 is less by 12 compared to the previous year. (62)

9. ELDERLY IN CRIME

This section entails the no. of senior citizens involved in various crimes such as rape, illegal possession of weapons, murder and so on.




Figure 8: Monthly Distribution of Elderly involved in Various Forms of Unlawful Activities

The given bar graph indicates the number elderly who involved in various unlawful activities in the year 2015.

- A total of fifty six cases were reported in 2015 where senior citizens were found involved in unlawful activities.
- Most (50) of the senior citizens involved in illegal activities were males.
- 24 senior citizens were held for sexual abuse.
- 6 were held for illegal possession of weapons, drugs and gold.
- 4 were napped for forgery.
- 5/5 were held for murder and attempted murder.
- 2/2 were arrested for gambling and black marketing.
- 2 were held for trafficking.
- 1 was held for theft.
- 5 were held for other crimes.

10. WINTER WOES

A total of 15 news were about those elderly who died due to freezing cold in the year 2015.

- Among them 9 were males and 6 were females
- Majority of victim (9) were from earth-quake hit Dolakha district.
- No news was reported except in the month of January and December.
